

John W. Morrison Jr. WA9EQM, "Tiny" as the Rockford hams knew his died February 28, 1982 in Rockford Memorial Hospital after a long illness.

"Tiny" was born February 8, 1922 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin where he lived most of his life. He moved to Rockford nine years ago. He married his wife June in Winter, Wisconsin on June 10, 1945.

"Tiny" spent many hours enjoying his hobby as a ham. He also spent many years raising bulldogs. He was a former member of RARA, a member of EARS, and a member of the Bulldog Club of America.

Memorial services were held March 3, in Greenwood Cemetary Chapel.

Any ARRL and RARA member can send his/her outgoing foreign QSL's thru RARA at no cost other than attending a RARA meeting. Just sort your cards alphabetically by prefix, bundle them up along with a QST mailing label and turn them in to Bob-WA9NTT or Gene-AK9N. Within a week they (the cards, not Bob and Gene) will be winging their way toward ARRL Headquarters and subsequently onward and outward.

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that there is a net being run in Rockford every day of the week 365 days a year. Yes, you are right it's the 6 meter State Line Rag Chewers Net. It is run at 50.4MHz A.M. at 9:00 p.m. You can get in on this fun for about \$25 by buying an older tube type crystal 6 meter rig at a hamfest and making a wire dipole antenna. TVI really isn't a big problem running low power like most of us do.

Let me tell you a little about this friendly little net. It has rotatable net control every night of the week. With Carl Cacciatore WB9PBR starting it off on Sunday Night, Scott Francis-WB9APA on Mondy Night, Lee Shelain-W9ZZL has Tuesday, I have Wednesday Night, Uncle Claude-W9VZ, who some of us like to call the "Mayor" because he is the backbone of the net, has Thursday Night, Friday Night Bob Mitchel-W9IGB does the honors and Saturday Night Mike Oberg-WB9JAU is at the stern.

Usually there are about 10 to 14 hams who check in from Belvidere to Winnebago and Madison to West Brooklin. We have even had check-ins from as far away as Canada during band openings. We have a good little go around even on New Years Eve and Christmas Eve, or in other words you will always find someone on 50.4MHz at 9:00 p.m. Why not fire up that old Gonset III, Sixer or Lunch Box and join in on the fun???

Don't advertise on the local repeater or 6 meter net of your vacation plans!

You might be inviting someone with a scanner to visit your domicile while you are away. This happened to a group of CB people in the Quad Cities a few years ago and they learned the hard way when 50% of them were ripped off while on a winter vacation.

Also, don't advise others of the current vacation of area hams as well. You may just be helping them get ripped off as well. If you hear someone calling for a local ham on vacation, call that person on the telephone and advise them of the fact etc. It is great temtation to be "helpful" but it might be "hurtful" instead.

When I go on vacation, I ask a good ham friend of mine to respond to calls for me via the telephone and I do the same for them in return.

Awards

The following is a nice write-up explaning why to QSL. You MIGHT send a copy to that guy who owes you his card since more than a year but you SHOULD read it and follow it.

WHY THE QSL CARD?

All through life we carefully preserve documents and valuable papers showing that in such and such a year on such and such date some important event (to us) took place, events such as the date we were born, the date we said our first word, the date the first tooth came through, date vaccinated, married, acclaimed, honored, and finally the date we died on.

The QSL card which the ham finds in his mailbox is his document of a worthwile event and accomplishment. It is tangible proof of his accomplishment.

Without QSL cards there would not be any award such as: DXCC, WAC, WAS, 5BDXCC, WAE, DUF, WBE, WAP, etc. and your pride of accomplishment would not be recognized.

The ham who works hard for his license sets up his rig (maybe even building it), spends possibly untold hours getting his antenna "just right", maybe even hours trying for a certain contact (maybe even YOU) certainly deserves a QSL for his efforts.

Not everyone likes QSL cards, some are not "interested", but those of us who take the trouble to send QSL cards certainly indicate that they WANT YOUR CARD, and I am sure that you must feel the same way about this as I do. To make the QSL chore a little easier many stations send along IRC's or stamps of the country worked and a SAE.

QSL's make me *HAPPY*, won't you help by sending me *YOUR CARD*? Thank you and I hope it makes *YOU HAPPY* too!

HOW TO GET QSL'S FROM THE BUREAU?

To receive QSL's from the bureau, you must have stamped SAE's on file. Otherwise your incoming cards will be discarded after a couple of months.

The easiest way to SASE's it to use postage and envelope credits. Here is how it works:

Send your request with the number of envelopes wanted with your call and mailing address and check to: **Ken Neuffer**, **W9ZA**, *9th Area QSL Manager*, *371 Oaklawn*, *Elmhurst*, *Illinois 60126*. The cost will be 50¢ per envelope or \$5.64 for 12. (*Includes 20¢ postage and addressing*). If you expect to get more than 6 cards per month, include enough extra postage at 17¢ per ounce. Each additional 17¢ will cover about 9 more cards.

EXAMPLE: 12 envelopes with 20¢ postage =\$5.64

12 Ounces of extra postage =\$2.04(12x17¢)

\$7.86 Total

Only one call per envelope.

This is for "9"-Calls only. For other calls request information from your call-area QSL bureau.

CQ DX

HI DXers:

A lot of good DX has been on lately, hope you've been getting your share. Remember patience in DXing is your most important friend. A perfect example happened to me last month with the arrival of a QSL from Heard Island VKØHM, seems I had a QSO with him January 19, 1970. Now that's what I call slow mail HI HI! Most importantly keep envelopes at the bureau, for many DX stations only QSL that way.

Propagation forcasts look for the early spring, so don't forget to tune 10. The band has had good openings to Asia, South America, and the South Pacific as late as 10 p.m. local time.

QSLing direct can be very expensive as you know. One easy way to cut costs in half is the buddy system. The way it works is you and a friend exchange your country lists and call each other when a new one comes on. After you both work him send your cards together. I do this with KB9IKP, KB9OW and KB9PC and have found that the QSL return rate has been better also.

In chasing DX whaen you run into the impossible pile up, that is you've called for 30 minutes or so and not even been heard at all don't stay on that sopt, tune the rest of the band and chances are very good you will find another one you need or come back and work him later.







ARRL Bulletin #21. February 18, 1982

FCC has assigned Docket #82/83 to a combined Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and Notice of Inquiry on the subject of HF phone band expansion.

The commission proposes expansion of the 14MHz phone band 5ØKHz, from 14.15Ø to 14.35Ø, with the new segment to be available equally to licenses of general class or higher. There would be no change to the segment 14.20Ø to 14.275MHz, which would continue to be available only to advanced and extra class.

In its Notice of Inquiry, the FCC requests comments on several issues relating to phone subbands, among them the desirability of expanding other phone bands and the proper relationship between frequency and mode privileges and license class.

Amateurs have until July 1 to send their comments to the Secretary, FCC, Washington, DC, 20554. Comments should be labeled with the Docket number, 82/83. Reply comments are due August 2. QST will carry comments.

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On June 3, 198/, the FCC adopted a Notice of Proposed Rule Making proposing to permit facsimile (A4 and F4) and television (A5 and F5) transmissions on certiain Amateur radio frequencies where they are not currently authorized.

In its Notice of Proposed Rule Making, the commission specifically proposed to allow the use of facsimile and television transmissions on all portions of the Amateur Radio Service bands where voice transmissions are allowed.

The frequencies between 1800 and 2000KHz were not included in the proposed revision in order to protect LORAN-A radio navigation operations. It was also proposed that the bandwidth of facsimile transmissions below 225MHz be limited to that of SSB voice emission with the exception that amplitude modulated double sideband facsimile transmissions between 50 and 225MHz would be limited to the bandwidth of an amplitude modulated double sideband voice emission. These bandwidth limitations already apply to television transmissions. Provisions to permit the simultaneous transmission of voice and facsimile were proposed which parallel existing provisions for simultaneous transmission of voice and television.

This relaxation of the rules affecting television and facsimile operation will permit experimentation and operation with those modes by larger base of amateur operators, thus contributing to the advancement of their technical skills. No harmful impact on the Amateur Radio Service is anticipated as a result of these revisions.

Accordingly it was ordered that effective February 22, 1982, part 97 of the commission Rules and Regulations, 47 CFR Part 97 was amended.

RARA'S OVER THE HILL CONTEST

Due to popular demand, (two or three people complained) RARA is sponsoring a DX contest. (Anything over the next hill is DX, right???)

- 1) Work anybody, anytime, any band, any mode. No limits at all so good luck with lists, nets, and other contests.
- 2) On the log sheet enter date and time (GMT of course), call of station worked, signal report (both ways), band, and mode.
- 3) To make the dupe sheet business easier, work any station only once. Submit dupe sheets for more than 100 QSO's.
- 4) Phone QSO's score one point. CW QSO's score two points. (Who said anything about fair).
- 5) Same classes as before: Novice/Technician, General, Advanced/Extra.
- 6) Multipliers are the FIRST LETTER OR NUMBER IN THE CALLSIGN of station worked. In other words; G4AWE is the same as GW4AWE but

- different from **9**Y4AWE. You can get 4 different multipliers from U.S. stations (*W*, *K*, *N*, and *A*). Maximum total of 36.
- 7) Contest period: any nine consecutive days during the month of June. If your first QSO is at Ø41Øz on June 12 your last one will be no later than Ø4Ø9z on June 21.
- 8) Scoring is simple. Multiply the sum of your QSO points by the number of multipliers.
- 9) Bonus: Anyone who works Field Day with a club (Active helper) scores a bonus of 1000points.
- 10) Contest logs should be submitted to P.O. Box 1744, Rockford, Illinois 61110 by July 15. Awards to be given out at the club picnic in August. In case of ties we will tear the certificate or saw the trophy in half.
