

CQ Contest

There are some new faces on the staff of the Ham Rag this year, but you fortunate readers have me to look forward to for another year. HI HI!

Club participation in SWEEPSTAKES was rather dismal last November. I sent in a list with only four names on it, so our club aggregate score will be down quite a bit for 1981. The February FCC SPECIAL is just around the corner. Complete rules appeared in the December Ham Rag. The trophies and plaques or whatever for the winners will be awarded at the club picnic in July. Dust off the mikes and keys and low band rigs and jump right in.

This year the ARRL NOVICE ROUNDUP will run from January 30th through February 7th. The purpose of the contest is the Novice and Technician class license to work as many other stations as possible during any 30 hours out of the nine day contest period. This is an opportunity for Novices to increase the CW speed for that upcoming trip to Chicago, to work stations to fill some of those needed states for WAS. and for other classes to give some QSO's to the Novices. The Novices and Technicians are allowed to work anybody while the rest of us are limited to working Novices and Technicians. The exchange consists of a signal report and ARRL section, which here in Rockford is Illinois. Complete rules are in the January QST.

Here is a special deal to all club members who participate: all (that it 100%) of your Novice Roundup contacts will count for the RARA FCC SPECIAL COMPETITION. Now that is an offer that will be hard to pass up.

Mention has previously been made here of the CW bulletins and practice sent by W1AW from ARRL Headquarters. For those who are not League members and do not have access to QST, a condensed schedule follows:

CW BULLETINS: (18 WPM)- sent at 4, 7, and 10 p.m. daily. Good code practice while working toward 20 WPM and above. Also a way to keep current on regulatory changes. On Thursday nights DX bulletin is sent.

SLOW CW: (5 to 15 WPM) - 6 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. 9 p.m. om Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays.

FAST CW: (35 to 10 WPM) - 6 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays. 9 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

For the fast and slow CW practice, excerpts from *QST* are transmitted. All times are CST until April 25, when they become CDT. The frequencies used are approximately 80KHz up from the bottom edge of each band (80 thru 10). On 80 meters the spot to listen to is 3580KHz.

CQ DX

DX IS. . .

DX IS amateur radio. Ragchewing on 2 meters and on 75 meters may be enjoyable and meaningful, but DXing is what amateur radio is all about. The thrill and excitement of chatting with your fellow man on the other side of the world enhances the mutual understanding of one another in a day and age fraught with troubles and conflicts.

DXers go through stages like those in other endeavors. First there is the awe in the possibility of being able to communicate world wide. Then there is the excitement of a DX contact contact anywhere. Soon contacts with Europe and south of the border become old hat with the semi-rare taking precedence. Ultimately, the very rare become the primary goal of many DXers. The DX award chasing can also be all consuming. Unfortunately, getting to know another land and people by regular lengthy communication is something that some DXers never experience. Visiting or being visited by a DXer is an unforgettable eyeball QSO few experience.

OSL TIPS

Requesting a OSL card can be an exasperating, futile trauma. Just sending a QSL via the bureau to a rare station is generally a waste of time. Getting another OSL from Illinois is probably not only of no value to him but actually a nuisance. If you really really want a QSL from a rare station that has no OSL manager, by all means write him a personal letter with your QSL. Tell him why getting his QSL card is so important to you. Let him know a little about your station and yourself. Don't just automatically include a "green stamp." Try an ARRL decal or something else special, mint stamps from his own country, or U.S. mint stamps if he is working on awards himself (so he can get OSLs from U.S. OSL managers for DX stations elsewhere in the world). Also enclose a self-addressed, European style (square) envelope, not a U.S. □6 or □10. If you are having trouble getting a QSL from a Communist or other country unfriendly to the U.S., try enlisting the aid of a ham in a "neutral" country. They can work wonders with the censors that may impede mail with the U.S. stamps on the envelope or U.S. bound, while hardly questioning "third world" mail.

DX Tips

Rumor is that OH2BH, Martim will be going to operate in ZA. Albania in August and BY, China in September.

Operation from VKØ, Heard Island, is again being targeted, this time for last winter.

FB8WG, Crozet, continues to allude most local DXers, but W9SS and K9IKP managed to work him on 20 meters long path on May 16. Anyone speak French? (Calling a DX station in his native language is probably worth about 10 db!)

BY1PK. China continues to show on 15m and 20m CW.

Look for good early morning (6 am) opening to the Pacific this time of year on 20m.

Contests to pick up a few new ones in certain parts of the globe include All Asian Phone, June 19-20.

SMØAGD, Eric is going on a two year world tour on a 50 foot yacht. Operations are planned from ZK1, ZM7, T31, KH1, T30, FW8, and A35 this year.

Possible deletions to the ARRL DX country list includes 8Z4, KHØ (Baja Nuevo), and KS4 (Serrana Bank.) If operations ever take place from North Korea, there would be a net increase of one resulting.

"Good Ones" showing up on 20m recently included, VK9ZR, Mellish Reef; AP2, Pakistan; HF5, Thailand; & FR 0FLO, MC for FB8WG.

Remember, building up your DXCC total amounts to two major things: longevity & perseverance! Good luck and good DX!

Novice Corner

Thinking back to my novice days as to what I had questions about. I think most of them concerned antennas. In this column I will try to relate some thoughts on dipoles; putting them up, etc.

Everyone is familiar with the formula for calculating the length of the dipole: 468/Frequency in MHz. Let's talk for a minute about an 80 meter dipole. How long are you going to make it? First you have to determine the frequency that you want to have the best SWR at. Because of the long wavelength of the 80 meter band, it's pretty hard to construct one antenna that will be usable on all frequencies available in the 80 meter band.

Our figure-A shows the calculated lengths for helping you choose the length depending on what frequencies you want to use most. Notice that from one end to the other there is a difference of 16.7 feet. Let's assume that you want to make the antenna for 3.7MHz. This would make the length 126.5 feet. However, I feel it is good practice to start longer, say 128 feet or a total of 64 feet on each side of the center insulator.

Now let's assume that we have assembled the antenna. How do we determine its final length? First raise the antenna to as close as possible to its final height. Apply power and check the SWR-B column which will give you data for plotting the Curve-C.

Now by looking at these charts you can tell about how much to trim your antenna. As you see we are most resonate it 3.6MHz, than 3.7MHz. If you look back at figure-A and compare the lengths you can see that we can trim off as much as 2.5 feet to move our SWR curve more toward the center of the band. (Remember we are talking about an 80 meter dipole. If we are making one for 10

meters, we could use the same procedures, but our lengths would be considerably different. In other words, when trimming a 10 meter dipole, don't cut off 2.5 feet!!!).

Now that we've trimmed the antenna (actually we've raised and lowered it several times taking a little off each time, and making another set of charts to prevent it from being too short) our final chart and curve might look like D & E.


Not happy with the fact that you can't use the whole band? Some things that can affect your SWR are:

- 1. Height above the ground. The higher you go (recommended is at least 35 feet for 80 and 40 meters) the sharper the SWR curve.
- 2. Inverted "V" vs DIPOLE this will not only change SWR but also your radiation pattern.
- 3. Size of wire if it gets too small, the SWR curve will be very sharp. For 80 and 40 meters I would recommend No. 14 or No. 12 wire.
- 4. Coaxial Dipoles, because they use the shield as well as center conductor for the element, make the equivalent of a very large wire. Sometimes has a good enough SWR that the whole band is usable.

There are many things that I've not covered that are also important. A very good source for more information is the "ARRL Antenna Book". Now that winter is here, there should be a lot of antenna work going on. It's never done when it's nice out, you know.

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
