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It's with a sad heart I announce that John Mori, N8TA has resigned from the RARA board this month. As always with RARA family comes first and his family needs him at this time. His friendship, mentoring, insight and guidance will be greatly missed at the board, club and personal level. Please keep John and his family in your prayers.

On a more upbeat note, thank you to all the club members who stepped up last month and volunteered for different positions within RARA. It was exciting to see so many members who have decided to become radioactive. I have updated the elected office and volunteer listings on pages 5-8 to now include all of the members who have volunteered along with the remaining positions and opportunities that are still open.

Unfortunately we have a serious problem that needs to be addressed. This last month it was brought to my attention that two of our current board members have exceeded the allowable service time on the board as outlined in the club's by-laws. This was an oversight last year that needs to be corrected for 2020. We also have three other board members who only have one more year that they can serve on the board. That means two current board members cannot serve in 2020, three more will limit out at the end of 2020, we are already two board members short right now due to the lack of volunteers and one recent resignation in 2019. That is seven out of eight board positions will change within a 14 month period. That is a drastic and unacceptable turnover in such a short time span. This is why we need our membership to step up every year and take an active role at the leadership level. It's imperative that every year we elect a certain amount of new members to the elected officer positions so that continuity in leadership can continue. 

Both repeaters (146.610 and 147.000 (both have a pl 114.8)) will function with both digital and analog radio signals, but the repeaters require time to determine whether the signal is digital or analog. To operate the repeater properly you must first be sure the frequency is clear, then key and hold the microphone button down for 1-2 seconds. Then begin speaking. If you fail to do this, the first part of your message will be lost.

## President (Elected November Meeting) Open In 2020

Presides at all meetings (monthly club and board meetings) according to the Rockford Amateur Radio Association's constitution, by-laws and rules of order. Appoint all committees, sign official documents and carry out the recommendations of the Board of Directors. The President is also Chairman of the Board and an automatic member of the Repeater Committee. This position starts at the January 2020 club meeting.

## Vice President (Elected November Meeting) Open In 2020

Presides over meetings if President is absent. This position is also the coordinator for all of the monthly club meeting programs (selecting and scheduling programs – with input and help from the RARA Board). This position starts January club meeting 2020.

# Secretary (Elected November Meeting) Open In 2020

Keeps meeting minutes (monthly club and board meetings), roll of members, provide applications for membership, and oversee amendments, changes & additions to the constitution and by-laws. This position starts January club meeting 2020.

## Treasurer (Elected November Meeting) Open In 2020

Is the custodian of monies received and expended, keeping records and issuing the Treasurer's Report to the Board of Directors every month at the RARA board meeting. This position starts January club meeting 2020.

## Four Directors (Elected November Meeting) All Four Positions Open In 2020

# My SWR Is Too High To Transmit by Kerry Tatlow KD9MAP

Occasionally I hear folks say that they are afraid to run their transmitter if their SWR is too high, fearing damage to the final amp.

I've consulted several sources, and I think that is probably not true for a modern rig.

Looking at the operating manuals for modern ICOM and Yaesu rigs, they say that the xmtr has protection circuitry to automatically reduce power to prevent damage, whatever the cause. (It may not have that protection on all of its bands, so you must consult your operating manual.)

In high SWR situations, the reflected power doesn't get reabsorbed by your xmtr circuitry; it gets re-reflected back toward the antenna. If the SWR is real bad, the power gets reflected back and forth several times before eventually radiating out of the antenna. Each reflection results in losses in the transmission line, and it is merely those losses you are trying to avoid when your goal is low SWR.

Remember also that an antenna with a single resonance frequency can't possibly give a perfect SWR across an entire band without using an antenna tuner.

I think if you find yourself in a high SWR situation that you can't quickly diagnose and remedy, go ahead and use the transmitter anyway, as long as people are copying you successfully. Of course you will diagnose and fix it whenever you are able, but meanwhile don't panic about breaking your rig just because your SWR is too high.

- By far the best book I've found on how RF (and LF AC) moves thru transmission lines is Johnson's 1950 "Transmission Lines and Networks." It is the most accurate and in-depth explanation of this stuff. However, the math is (necessarily) very very difficult.

# **Volunteer & Help!!!!!**

The Head of the Rock Regatta is a rowing race of 5,000 meters (3.2 miles) on the Rock River, beginning at Martin Park and finishing at the YMCA. It is a sanctioned event of the United States Rowing Association, requiring the observance of US Rowing race protocol. The Head of the Rock has expanded over the past 34 years into one of the Midwest's premier rowing events with clubs also competing from as far away as Alaska. There are now over 65 teams with 2000 participants. Collegiate teams are represented, and 16 US Rowing licensed referees maintain safety and fairness of the race. The event attracts over 5,000 spectators each year.

The Rockford Regatta began in 1985 as a challenge match between the University of Wisconsin and Northwestern University. The original match was conceived by local Rockford rowers, Rob Espeseth (a U.S. Olympian) and Dennis Kaderabek. The very next year 275 athletes and 14 clubs competed in the 1st Annual Head of the Rock Regatta. The Head of the Rock has grown over the past 34 years into one of the Midwest's premier rowing events. It is a

sanctioned event of the United States Rowing Association and is listed in the US Rowing Rules of Rowing as a Nationally Recognized Regatta. For at least 12 years amateur radio has been the go-to group for radio communications.

This year we are looking for at least 22 hams to participate in this event. You do not need to belong to any group or organization to be involved in this great event.

You do not need to have expensive equipment to be involved (an Ht will do) just a willingness to be involved and help no matter what the weather may bring.

This will be a great chance to not only test your equipment but also your communicating skills with other hams from northern Illinois.

Bring your families along to help you out or just have them enjoy the day on the rock river.

# Ham Radio Adventures by Larry Schubert - AC9GO

It happened so long ago that I can't remember the year let alone the date. I remember that I was tuning around the ham radio bands when I heard what sounded like a desperate call for help. "Can anybody help me? This is the yacht Honeybee." Was it a hoax? I wondered. Anyone who has a radio on the amateur frequencies should know that you have to identify your station with your call sign, but no the plea continued. "This is the yacht Honeybee. I need help. Can anybody help me?" By law at the time, no one could legally help this desperate man. It almost hurt to listen to his calls. These calls had gone on for some time. I know it seemed like an hour, but it may have only been 10 or 15 minutes. I held back from saying anything, and was about to pick up the mike when another Ham called to the man and explained that he had better have a reason to be on the air, and that he was in violation of federal law.

The man came back with an explanation that sounded more like fiction then fact. It couldn't have been written any better by Hemingway. Imagine, if you can, that you are a deck hand on a yacht in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean when the captain and owner of the yacht dies of a heart attack. It is dark. There is no one on the yacht but you, and now a dead body. The Captain had only given you the information as to where you are going, and you know you left Miami. You have no idea where you are, or how to get to where you are set to meet the rest of the family. It is dark, as dark as only the sea can make it, with nothing but the yacht to provide light. By the compass on the boat, you know what direction you are headed, and really little else. Scary to think about isn't it.

At this point another group of Hams joined the first to help this man. One called the Coast Guard in Washington D.C., and another called Miami who handed it off to New Orleans because they could make better contact because of the way radio waves skip in the ionosphere at the

frequency where they were transmitting. Here in the upper midwest I could hear most of the conversation which lasted late that night. I remember the Hams relaying information to the man that at a certain point he would see two lights from light houses, and that he should make a turn to a set heading to the south. This was before the days of GPS, and satellite telephones let alone cell phones, which would be almost worthless in that situation. At some point, the man was able to get to his destination. It was this incident that perhaps precipitated a change in the law, because soon after this, the law was changed. At this time, if you have an emergency and no license, and Ham radio is the only form of communication available, you may use it to contact someone for help but only if you are in a life threatening situation.

Over the years Hams have provided assistance to people in need wherever communication is needed. They are the only means of communication many times when disaster hits. You will find them in large numbers at times when a hurricane has wiped out all other forms of communication. Hams spot tornadoes for community protection. Out west you may find large groups of Ham operators, helping keep track of forest fires, and fire fighters. Hams meet daily on a Ham radio network to assist ships at sea, (14.300 mhz) and let them know the latest in weather developments, as well as vessels that are missing at sea. Today we often communicate by digital means where large quantities of information can be transferred at one time like names of hurricane survivors for family and friend inquiries.

A number of years ago I went with a number of Hams from the Rockford area to provide communication for the victims of the Plainfield, Illinois tornado. When we arrived most of us were asked to provide communication for the Salva-

tion Army that was providing meals and other items 24 hours a day to anyone who needed help. The Hams in the area were asked if we could provide some relief to the Hams in the Plainfield area that had been on the air for most of the week, and needed some down time. I was there for 24 hours straight. The destruction was unbelievable. Whole subdivisions were wiped out. All utilities were destroyed, and I was assigned to a truck that was providing hot meals to everyone all night long. We provided meals to utility workers, helpers, as well as victims of the F-5 tornado that had taken 29 lives and injured over 350 people just the Tuesday afternoon before. The tornado is considered the strongest to hit Illinois in the twentieth century. It is the only F-5 known to ever hit the greater Chicago area.

There was no warning. The weather bureau had issued a severe thunder storm warning. After this storm, the bureau learned to issue tornado watches and warnings in time for people to seek shelter. Ham radio plays a part in this as well as weather spotters to spot troubling weather before it hits. This is not to down play the addition of Doppler radar and the computerized models that help detect these storms. Radar can tell them where it is possible, but people have to see the storm to detect tornadoes.

I was so tired when I left Plainfield that I stopped along side of I 39 between I 80 and Rockford because I was falling asleep. The 24 hours without sleep finally took it's toll. I was tired but fulfilled because I was able to help a lot of people that night just providing communication between net control and the people I was working with for the Salvation Army. We heard a lot of stories that day from the people that survived the storm as well as the generosity of the people that donated food and clothing to the Salvation Army. My means of communicating that day was the cheapest handheld radio on the market at the time. It was a small Kenwood handy talky. I had two batteries, which lasted the whole 24 hours or so that I was there. I think that it ran about 5

Watts on high power and about 150 Miliwatts on low, and I had to run it on high most of the time. Nothing fancy, this little thing had thumb wheels to set the frequency, and switches for the tone. There were no memory channels. If you didn't remember a frequency, and it's sub-audible tone you were not able to get into the repeater.

There have been a number of Ham radio adventures through the years. Like the time I chased a small tornado down the road in Michigan. Got a little close for comfort on that one! Listening to a ship in the Pacific talking to a Doctor on shore about a medical problem that a sailor had with an infected abscess on his shoulder, and what they needed to do before they got him to shore. These types of things used to all be taken care of by Ham radio, as well as servicemen calling home for Christmas with phone patches. I remember one night listening for the Hurricane net at about the time the storm was hitting the shore in the south. A number of guys were trying to check in, but the storm had disrupted communications so bad that they could not hear each other. At the time I was running the Illinois Single Sideband net, and well versed in running a net, since I could hear most of the people calling I hopped on the air and suggested that I could take check ins until the net control could take over. After a little while he showed up, and apparently had been copying me because he knew who all had checked in.

There have been a lot things I've done over the years with Ham radio. Some of it on the air, and some just listening. As I write this there is a storm about to hit Florida. There are Hurricane nets set up on 20m and 40m. On 20m 14.325 mhz upper side band, and on 40 m at 7.268 mhz lower side band. These are run out of the National Hurricane Center. Other frequencies to watch include the Maritime mobile net on 20m at 14.300 mhz, and three 80m LSB nets at 3.815, 3.950, and 3.940 mhz. Good spots to listen to, and who knows you may be able to help in some way. If you aren't licensed yet, we can help you

with that. The ARRL has plenty of resources. The test is 35 questions. Passing is only 75% or 27 out of the 35 questions. There is no longer a morse code requirement to pass any of the Ham radio tests. The tests are multiple choice. They are taken from a pool of questions that changes each 4 years. http://www.arrl.org/questionpools is the url to the question pools for all three licenses. The Technician is the first, then General second, and for all the privileges the Exrta class. Practice tests are available at several places on the internet. When I took my Extra class license in 2012, I used several. I had an ap on my phone, I used several on the Internet. The Arrl.org had a practice test. QRZ.com had a practice test both good, but the one I liked the most was at HamStudy.org. I also purchased an Extra class license book from the ARRL. If you are just starting out. I would suggest that you get a

license manual from the ARRL. It will cover almost everything you need for the Technician license. The club (RARA) will supply you with an Elmer, that's what we Hams call a mentor in Ham speak, and any other help you need along the way for setting up your station or anything. On top of that, the club offers programs once a month on topics like Building or installing antennas. Satellite or space station communication, digital communication, low power communication, using Linux in place of Microsoft, or Apple in your computer, portable communication, setting up a ham radio in your car or RV, and the list goes on. Say, if I can help, let me know. The tests in the area are listed here in the Rag. I want to talk to you on the air.
