

A few from the October RARA WAS CONTEST have managed to find their way into the contest office. There are enough for a trophy in each of three classes. The goodies will be awarded at the Christmas Party; that's where you find out who the winners are. While on the subject of club sponsored contest, there is another one comming up shortly. In honor of the current call sign system (?) by the FCC (I shouldn't poke fun - AK9), our February competition will be called the FCC SPECIAL. Whether or not we will add to or subtract from the existing confusion is yet to be determined. The general idea is to have some fun. More detailed rules appear elsewhere in this issue.

For those if you out there who still lack some of the 50 for WAS, try doing some operating during the various state and district QSO PARTIES. For instance, the WISCONSIN QSO PARTY which is normally held in April, we can assume that there will be more Wisconsin stations on the air than at other times. From the Contest Corral in the December issue of QST (page 102) we see the following QSO PARTIES approaching: Ø DISTRICT with the states of Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, North and South Dakota. The North Dakota and Texas QSO PARTIES together with the TWO-LAND QSO PARTY of New York and New Jersey are all coming soon. A couple of those states are hard to find. Even more so if it is the last one for your ALL BAND WAS.

For the speed demon, hot shot type CW operators out there who have memory keyers, keyboards, and computer interfaces; there is a CW type contest which begins New Year's Eve. It is NOT a 60 QSO

per hour, work all multiplier variety of contest - not really a contest at all. It is called STRAIGHT KEY NIGHT and full particulars are on page 102 in the December QST.

One more contest plug and it will be time to QST. 73 magazine is sponsoring a contest on 40 and 80 meters the weekend of January 9 and 10. For the 5BWAS chasers, it will be a way to fill up the empty spaces on those two bands. Perhaps some DX will find its way into your log also. It is a phone only contest, I guess that mode hasn't died out yet. Complete rules in the December Contest Corral and probably in a recent issue of 73. I see by the clock on KI9F's wall that it's time to go home. May every one have a happy holiday season. See you in '82.

### CQ DX

Hi gang! The bands are doing pretty good so take advantage of them. This is the 81-82 winter season with low noise levels on 40 and 80 meters. Also remember the sunspot cycle is going down and soon it will be too late.

Six meters has had some very good openings to JA, ZS, etc. Who is going to have the first DXCC on 6? Six is like Ten when it is open. Low power and good antennas will do wonders. Ten meters will usually follow the sun-Europe early and Asia late.

FB8WG, Crozet, is getting more active. Murray-N9Mp worked him. W9SS, K9LUX and of course K9IKP are still trying hard but so far without any luck. We will keep trying. FB8WG is on the W7PHO net (14.225) in the mornings. He is also on 21.320 Saturday mornings with FY7AN.

#### HOT NEWS - 3Y BOUVET ISLAND

DK9KD says the Cologne DX group plans to go there in January of 1982. Estimated cost of the trip is \$45,000. This is needed to rent a ship for starters. Bouvet is on an ice covered island year around. Landing is very difficult because of high seas. Call signs to be used are 3YØA and 3Y0B. 5 or 6 stations will be taken to the island. If you can work them, do it. Bouvet Island is probably more rare than FB8W-Crozet.

KB9PC-Gertrude has a new KT-34XA KLM beam up, The pile-ups are going to be wild now. Guess I better order a new antenna so I can keep competetive.


There is a big Ten meter contest in December, a good way to get some new countries for your count.

### **FCC SPECIAL**

- CONTEST PERIOD: The month of February. You may work the full 673 hours or any portion thereof. Logs must be in GMT.
- BANDS: All except 27Mhz. (They are confused already).
- OBJECT OF CONTEST: To have members of RARA contact other amateurs around the country thereby stimulating an interest in the hobby.
- 4). EXCHANGE: RST and state.
- 6). CLASSES: A) Novice/Technician
  - B) General
  - C) Advanced/Extra

If you upgrade during the contest, the highest license held determines class.

- QSO's: One point for each AMERICAN station worked. Determined by callsign only.
- 8). MULTIPLIERS:
  - A) 50 STATES plus PUERTO RICO. All Caribbean stations are scored as in Puerto Rico. All Pacific stations are scored as in Hawaii. TOTAL IS 51.
  - B) AMERICAN PREFIXES.

    Work as many as possible.

    Examples: WB2, W1, KP4,

    KL7 and AK9. Remember

    that AK9N & AK8N are

    different prefixes while KI9F

    & KI9G are the same. Also

    remember the portable oper
    ators like DK3XJ/W9 who is

    a W9 like W9MOS.
- 9). SCORE: Multiply QSO's times STATES times PREFIXES. Example: You work 200 QSO's with 100 PREFIXES and 35 STATES. That is 2000 × 100 × 35 = 7000,000 points.
- 10.) DUPE SHEETS: Duping is required for any

- score over a million. This means a dupe sheet for QSO's and a dupe sheet for PREFIXES as well as the numbering of new STATES as worked.
- 11). AWARDS: A trophy or plaque to the winners of each class. If participation is good there will also be certificates to the next 5 in each class. (Good means at least one more than we had in the RARA WAS CONTEST.)
- 12). ADVANTAGES: To correct any unfair advantages some may have; NO NET or CONTEST QSO's are permitted. The exception that proves the rule is NOVICE ROUNDUP. You may work novices until they turn green.
- 13). DISQUALIFICATION: Violation of the Amateur Radio Regulations or the rules of this contest. Un sportsmanlike conduct or excessive duplicates. (More than 2%). Actions of the contest committee are final.
- 14). DEADLINE: All entries must be postmarked no later than April 14th. (The day before the IRS starts looking for you.) Send logs, dupesheets, etc. to: P.O. Box 1744, Rockford, Illinois 61110. Put contest on the outside of te envelope or lose 5,000 points. (OUCH!)

W7DI, formerly W9ERU, Gene Hubbell was featured recently in the Arizona Republic - a newspaper serving the Mesa, Tempe, Scottsdale area. Gene had two different stories plus a picture in the paper featuring his station and antenna systems.

OSCAR 9 is now in orbit. This latest satellite was launched on October 6th from Vandenberg AFB California aboard the NASA rocket that carried the Mesophere Explorer mission into space. The satellite is the first built by radio amateurs in Great Britain, however many of the components that went into the spacecraft were donated by various sources worldwide making it truly an international effort.

Unlike previous OSCAR spacecraft, OSCAR 9 does not have two-way communications

capability. Instead the satellite will be used to conduct a variety of experiments. While in orbit, about 300 miles above the earth, the satellite will be used by scientists to study the various ways radio signals travel in the earth's ionosphere and the suitability of different frequencies for use in future satellites. Scientists will conduct two experiments never before carried on by radio amateurs. One involves a camera, which is mounted on the satellite that will send digital images back to earth. These images will provide weather information and will be used to augment classroom science programs. The other amateur first is a speech synthesizer. The system has a vocabulary of 120 words and will enable scientists to relay data worldwide through the satellite in "English".

Because of its polar orbit, which means the earth revolves under the satellite as it moves from pole to pole, total coverage of the earth will be achieved. Ham operators in every part of the world will have access to the satellite to monitor its progress and receive any information sent by it.

Before I say 73, I would like to say how much I have enjoyed doing this page every month even though looking at a blank piece of paper is sometimes rather depressing. Thanks to all who have supplied me with information during the year. Make 1982 the best ever!
