
please turn in the results of your efforts. You do not need all 50 states.

Just notify the editor or myself so your name can be put on the list that has to be submitted to the ARRL. Next time you talk to your buddy on the repeater, tell him that you are going to beat him in the SS CONTEST.

For those of us who are able to find room for a lot of antenna, the annual ARRL 16Ø METER CONTEST will take place the weekend of December 4-6. This year will be the first where we can use full legal power from 18ØØ to 19ØØKHz. There are still power and geographic restrictions in the top half of the band.

Due to the troubles the club has been having with the Christmas Party, the 10 METER CONTEST will not fall on the same weekend as our bash. The ARRL frolic is the second weekend of December (the 12th & 13th). Complete rules for both the 10 & 160 METER CONTESTS are in the November QST on page 100.

DO NOT FORGET to send in your results from the **RARA WAS COMPETITION**. All 500 states do not necessarily have to be worked to finish on top in your class. If you have more than anyone else - you've done it. So send in your list by November 15 to either the P.O. Box or to KI9F or AK9N.

9N1MM

Marshall D. Moran-9N1MM was born in Chicago, Illinois on May 29, 19Ø6. Mr. Moran went to public school in Chicago Heights, St. Ignatuis High and later to Loyola University where he obtained a doctorate in philosophy. Mr. Moran then went into the Jesuit order as a student. He was asked if he would like to work in the missionary field. In 1929 Brother Moran left Chicago and was sent to St. Mary's College in Kurseong, India where he was ordained as a priest on November 22, 1935. It was a most joyful remembrance for Father Moran and his family.

Father Moran's skills are not surprising in view of his background, interests and education.

Father Moran spent 21 years in India, mostly in educational work at Patna, a big center for Middle Western Jesuits in Bihar Province. There he met and became the friend of the man who was to become the prime minister of India, Jawaharlal Nehru.

Father Moran knew many Nepalese at Patna and visited the country in 1949. In 1950, When Nepal's ruling family of hereditory prime ministers, the Ramas, decided they wanted a good school near Katmandu, it was Father Moran they asked to do the job.

He jumped at the chance to become the country's first christian ministry since 1768, although he was forbidden to make converts.

Father Moran who speaks Nep ali, Urdu and Hindu has seen many changes in Nepal. The greatest, he says, is in the attitude of the people, in the widening of their mental horizons. He puts it this way:

Thirty years ago, most Nepalese didn't know or care where Calcutta was; today they're conscious of the world. They know a little and they intend to know a lot more."

Father Moran who founded St. Xavier's School in Nepal, where it is almost impossible to make overseas telephone calls, makes several emergency radio contacts a year all over the world. Nepalese and foreigners - anyone with an urgent problem or distant relatives he is anxious about - can count on the energetic priest to beam in for them almost anywhere on earth.

Father Moran has many friends in the

mountain - climbing fraternity and Tensing Norkey, the Sherpa tribesman who with Sir Edmund Hillary was first to scale Mount Everest, is "a great pal" of his. When the American expedition conquered Everest in 1963 it was 9N1MM who relayed radio bulletins from the climbers to newspaper correspondents in Katmandu, an account of which appears in James Ullman's book, American on Everest.

Father Moran figures in more than one book about Nepal, and for other reasons besides his radio exploits. He is lauded in Chester Bowles' Ambassador's Report, in the adventure-packed Tiger for Breakfast and The Fabulous Flemings; he is even a character in the novel The Mountain is Young.

Father Moran is a daredevil who retains a boyish love of danger. He often speeds from school to his many appointments on his motorcycle, a beret perched on his head, the skirts of his cassock flying out behind him.

Father Moran started his school with 10 Nepalese boys who came with him from his school in Patna. Today it's student body is more than seven times larger. St. Xavier's is the only high school in Nepal that is accredited by Cambridge University in England as well as by all universities in the United States.


"Since 1956, only two of my students have failed the Cambridge University exam", says Father Moran, "and 50% have straight A's. Each year when my five students apply for the Nepalese scholarships in medicine, they are tops amoung the two or three thousand applicants in India."

Father Moran is well known as a humanitarian. "He lends a hand wherever there is a need; he's called on in all sorts of emergencies. A scholar, a manager and diplomat - he never discusses government policy or plays a role in politics - he is also a craftsman who can do all kinds of work, including plumbing and car repairs. He's even an amateur doctor."

Rockford Amateur Radio Association is proud and honored to present the distinguished Father Moran as guest speaker at our November 27 meeting.

For those of us who awake around 5:30 am, 2 meters is where the action is. On the Rockford EARS Repeater (146.01/.61) traffic from mobiles begins to fill the airwaves. Gary-WA9JFM and Bob-W9IGB are enroute to their work QTH's. Gary has the longest distance to travel as he hails from the Wisconsin area. Then around 6:00m Dale-KC9BN and MoeN0CCE begin to flap their jaws. Moe is enroute to school while Dale's home having a cup of coffee, looking for his dress slacks and talking on 2 meters all at the same time.

In the past years Rockford area hams were able to check into what was known as the *LABOR NET*. Lee-W9ZZL held morning nets to greet area motorists. However, due to his health, Lee had to discontinue net operations. Boy it sure would be nice to hear the *LABOR NET* back on the air.

Bill-KB9UR has been doing a fantastic job in conducting both the 2 and 10 METER NETS held each Monday evening. Bill has expressed appreciation for the number of check-ins each week, however he is concerned about the lack of traffic. Bill explains, traffic as related to amateur radio can come from many differend sources such as - QST, 73, other publications or other nets. Not all hams read these magazines from cover to cover. So pick out an article and bring it up for discussion.

As of last month Bill has recruited Steve-KB9IW to assist him in acting as net control. Steve will take over as net control on all the odd Monday's while Bill will take all the even Monday's. They both work at the same place so it will be easy for them to exchange information.

One net which is in need of more participation and possibly a new net control operator is the Thursday CWNET. Jim-KI9F has mentioned that check-ins are few. (About 2 or 3 a week). This could be due to the speed which Jim is sending. Jim explains, "I CQ at several different speeds and work the people at what ever speed they check in at. If an extra is on the list ahead of a novice, then the novice has to listen to code that is fast. If the novice is first, the extra waits for the slower novice." When asked Jim admitted another control station would be nice.

Other nets to take part in are the BLACKHAWK VALLEY 10-X held each Wednesday and the 6 METER NET held nightly. Steve-KB9YX has been net control since the group went on the air in 1978. The 6 METER NET has a rotating net control system with about 10 regular checkins.



QSL

Most of us at some time or another have occasion to ask our fellow ham to confirm a QSO with a QSL. Either to fill up an empty drawer in the operating desk, to hide an ugly spot on the wall, or to be able to apply for an award. There are a number of options for both stateside and DX; this short article will hopefully be of help.

OUTGOING DX

- 1) Probably the most expensive way to get a card back from the foreign ham is to send him your QSL direct, along with a self addressed envelope & some International Reply Coupons for the return card. At the price of overseas postage and those IRC's, DXCC will come to more than some of us would like to spend. One advantage is that if the QSL does come back, it will be quickly.
- 2) Some hams run outgoing services for profit (probably small). They will send out so many of your cards for so much money. Check the ads in the various ham magazines.
- 3) As a member of the ARRL, you can send your cards to Newington where they are forwarded to the foreign bureaus. The cost is \$1.00 per pound of cards and a QST mailing label.
- 4) Since RARA is affiliated with the ARRL, its members can take advantage of the previous option as a group. Just bring your DX cards (sorted of course) to a club meeting, where they will be collected. The club will pick up the dollar per pound and postage costs. Don't forget the mailing label from your last copy of QST.

INCOMING DX

With all these cards leaving "via buro" you need some way to collect them. The Northern Illinois DX Association runs the 9-land incoming bureau. They request a self-addressed stamped envelope (4½"x9") with your call printed in the upper left hand corner. When the envelop is full they send your cards out. Send your envelope to:

STATESIDE

There is a QSL service for USA and VE hams run by N7BMY. No outgoing DX cards are handled. You can send her SASE's to claim your cards and any cards that you want to send out. According to the flyer there is no charge for this service, but donations are accepted.

Some DX have have what is called QSL managers. They send their manager the logs, and the manager takes care of the QSL chores. This makes it easier for us since it costs only two first class stamps to confirm that rare one, as long as the manager is in the USA.

With this information you should be able to start collecting sacks full of QSL cards. The only difficult part remaining is to work the stations in the first place.
