

ARLS007 Fox-1C and 1D Satellites to Include L-Band Uplink; Fox-1E to Have Linear Transponder

AMSAT Vice President-Engineering Jerry Buxton, N0JY, has announced plans to incorporate an L-band receiver in the Fox-1C and Fox-1D satellites. This will allow ground controllers to select the normal U/V configuration or the new L/V 1.2 GHz (23 cm) mode. Both bands will operate as FM single channel.

"Rather than adding a complete new receiver, the L band 'Project Downshifter' will convert the received L-band signal down to the Fox-1 uplink frequency and feed it to the UHF receiver on the Fox-1 satellite," Buxton explained. "The design will not require an additional antenna on the satellite, because the existing UHF antenna will work for L band receive as well."

A new group of volunteers is working on a companion uplink station to convert UHF to the L-band uplink frequencies. Team members include Bruce Herrick, WW1M; Dan Hubert, VE9DAN; Elizabeth Schenk, KC1AXX; Dave Smith, W6TE, and Alfred Watts, AF5VH.

The team plans to have an affordable L-band uplink ground station available to amateurs by the time Fox-1C is on orbit.



QRX one.....some random DX thoughts are coming through.....

The much hyped Spratly Islands DX-pedition (yawn) turned out to be the event that never really got off the ground. The operators finally arrived a day or two late. While antennas were being put up one of the operators became ill and it was determined that this condition required serious medical help. A medivac aircraft was dispatched from the Philippines. As it neared the DX-pedition island it was reportedly harassed by a Chinese fighter plane, and it aborted its mission and returned to the Philippines. A second rescue flight the following day picked up the sick operator and one or two others and got them back safely. Because of the uncertain political climate, the Philippine naval vessel which carried the operators to Spratly was ordered to return a day early. QSO claims that I've seen ,range from 3,500 to 5,000. Many of those QSOs were with JA and VK, and very few with North America. Contrast that with the 140,000 QSOs made by the Navassa Island team.

Heard in passing: "Naw, I don't work DX. I only have a little station." Or, "I can't do any DXing. All I have is a wire antenna."

Sound familiar? Well, it's mostly untrue. If you have the desire to talk with people in faraway places, realize that you **CAN** do it. Pull up a good DX Cluster on the Internet, maybe DX Summit or DX Watch. The cluster will show you what DX stations are on the air **RIGHT NOW**, what their frequency is, who they're working, and a lot of other information. Pick out an exotic station that's working North America and see if you can hear him. If so, chances are you can work him. It may take some patience and a lot of calling, but keep on trying. Remember, a juicy DX contact in your log-book is like a tasty fish in your frying pan. Personal note: when I started DXing I worked 179 countries with 100 watts and a vertical. Ask Steve Twigg, W9SWT how many countries he's worked on PORTABLE antennas. See what you can work on one of the major worldwide DX Contests, like the ARRL International, the CQ Worldwide, the CQ World Prefix (WPX). There's a lot of DX OUT THERE just waiting for your call.

Heard Through the QRN:

MONACO, 3A -a couple of French ops were active from Monaco during the first week of April. This is a tough DX contact

FIJI, 3D2. A New Zealander was active from Fiji early in April

KUWAIT, 9K. The Kuwait ARS was active through mid month with special event call sign 9K90IARU to celebrate the 90th anniversary of the IARU.

CHATHAM ISLAND, VK7. A couple of Aussie operators were active this month.

BHUTAN, A5. A group of four Japanese operators began ops from Bhutan on April 30 and will continue through May 5.

ZIMBABWE, Z2. Saudi operator was active around mid April from Zimbabwe, which is always a great DX contact.

LESOTHO, 7P. A South African op was active from neighboring Lesotho in mid April.

MARIANA ISLANDS, KH0. A Japanese op was active throughout April from Saipan.

CLIPPERTON ISLAND, FO. Alain, F6BFH has been active as Tx5P from CLIPPERTON. He is there on work assignment.

LEBANON, OD. Walid, OD5ZZ has been very active from his home in Tripoli.

Generally Speaking

One of the Local QRPers came beating his way up the hill the other day, puffing and sweating as the first signs of early summer took their toll. It really wasn't very warm, but the QRPer looked like he'd spent quite a few hours sitting in front of the rig this winter. We'd seen this before, and once the antenna and tower work began in earnest, he'd be back in shape.

He flopped down in the chair beside us, wiped a bit of sweat from his brow, and asked, "What is the best DX rig?" We thought for a moment and then used the old trick of answering a question with a question, "Why do you ask?"

"Because all the Big Guns at the DX club were arguing about it at the meeting last night. One of them has one of those TS-2000 rigs, and he swears nothing can touch it! But another one bought a FT-5000MP over the winter, and he was just as adamant it was the best DX rig. And then this other guy who has 340 or 350 worked said he was happy with his TS-590, and that if you spent any more on a rig, it wouldn't make any difference!"

We nodded and peered over our bifocals at the QRPer with a non-committal look. He took a deep breath and continued on. "Last fall I bought a FT-857. It's a middle-of-the-road rig. And with my 600-watt amp and tri-bander, I worked a lot of DX with it these past six months. Now I'm beginning to wonder. Maybe if I had a \$5000 rig, I'd have worked more DX. And if a lot of DX is good, more must be better. Maybe I should buy an FT-5000MP or an IC-7800. What do you think?"

We thought about our FT-101 that was still grinding away after 25 years, and of all the DX we'd worked with it. Often we'd been tempted by the glossy ads and the new bells and whistles, but we'd stuck to our DX guns. Maybe if we had bought a new rig every few years, we'd have worked more DX. But maybe we wouldn't have, either.

The QRPer was tapping his fingers on the table, waiting for an answer. We took our time, and then replied. "You've heard the Old Timer say that all things are relative, although some more so, right?" The QRPer nodded and replied impatiently, "Yes, yes, I know! He always says that. It's what Albert always said too. But what's it got to do with buying a new rig? Should I dig into my savings and get one of the new high end rigs or not?"

We weren't about to advise anyone on how much money to spend on a rig, so we decided to hit him with one of the Eternal Enigmas of DXing. "That's the special theory of DXing the Old Timer kept telling you. You obviously haven't heard of the general theory of DXing, have you?"

"What's that?", he said, standing up and staring at us, "and what does it have to do with buying a new rig?"

We looked at him and replied in a knowledgeable tone, "DXers believe that, generally speaking, he who has the best antenna will work more DX. And generally speaking, he who spends more time in front of the rig will work more DX. And generally speaking, he who has the biggest amp will work more DX. So maybe the general theory of DXing implies he who has the most expensive rig will work the most DX too. But it never has been proven. Albert spent years working on a unified DX theory, and he never figured it out."

The QRPer looked confused, and he just stared at us. We stared right back at him, and said, "Generally speaking, however, Albert did prove that he who has the best propagation wins. That is why DX IS!"

He jumped to his feet and bellowed, "What kind of answer is that?" We shrugged as he stomped out the door and down the hill, probably no wiser than he had been a few hours earlier. Someday he would probably understand, but maybe he'd have to go through a half dozen expensive radios before it sunk in.
