




FRIDAY MORNING BREAKFAST

Feature Article

BUILD A GO-BOX with Dave Gauger, W9CJS

I surely enjoyed my 2Kw, Hunter Bandit amplifier feeding my 3 Element Tri-bander beam on a 40 ft tower. I had reached the pinnacle of HF operating, and yes, it surely did work out. I enjoyed having a response to any CQ on most any band or mode ... BUT ...after a while I tired of being on top of the heap, king of the hill, top dog, and so forth. I called this "Brute-itis" ...

Actually, I thought lovingly of the early days of my Ham experience ... young teen ... S-38 receiver ... crystal controlled rig and so forth ... just like you remember We had fun, probably more fun then than now. The bands were wide open and just loaded with AM or CW signals. Just today I tuned 20 m CW and found only one loud signal, W1AW blowing in over S9, but not one other CW signal did I hear.

Perhaps others are feeling "Brute-itis", perhaps some of you are feeling "bored" with it all. I suggest an answer.

Take on a challenge ... try a new (to you) mode, have you tried PSK, or QRP, or FT-8 and so on? It can re-energize your Ham experience. And also, why not design and build a Go-Box which fits your equipment and your personal needs. and provides a means of operating "In the field" It's great fun.

Many years ago TenTec came out with a couple of very simple QRP transceivers. Each had several PC boards one for each main function. A friend shared that with his business, he could buy the individual PC boards, so I had him buy a complete set for me.

I assembled them together with a home built keyer board from a QST "Der Kleiner Keyer" circuit, and built my own mechanism. Together, mounted in an 8x10x4 inch aluminum box and with a 6:1 vernier dial and two 6volt lantern batteries, I built a QRP rig. I had made a simple transceiver, totally portable, battery operated, and I had more fun than in a long time.

Today, some 40 years later, I'm still fiddling with QRP, and portable rigs. Over the years I've built a number of Go-Boxes housing various rigs from an IC-735 to an IC-703, and two years ago I bought the IC-705, and yes housed it in a home brew Go-Box.

This interest in both QRP and field operating using a rig in a Go-Box has proven to be a shot in the arm for my Ham interest, and now with POTA (Parks On The Air), the portable rigs in Go-Boxes have teamed up with homemade MagLoops to provide a ton of fun.

Many of you share the same experience as I've depicted above. Why not branch out if you haven't already, and build a Go-Box. Then take it on vacation with you, or spend an hour at Rock Cut State park. It's great fun.

LOOKING AHEAD with Dave Gauger W9CJS JULY RARA MEETING – WE HOPE YOU CAN BE THERE

Verna Schubert, KD9YUM has suggested for our July meeting, we zero in on GO-BOXES. I think that's an excellent idea, considering the significant experience among some of our members. Expanding on her suggestion, why not widen the involvement, a little, as outlined below. It seems to me that there are two general areas of interest.

Comprehensive wide coverage portable setups.

1) Some have equipment intended for real-world emergency events where Ham radio has proven to be of immense value in back-up communication and eyes-and ears reporting, and also health-and-welfare messages during emergencies.

Often, this equipment is outfitted for most any foreseeable event. Not only do they provide competent equipment, but operators who've had training in the rigors of a controlled net and regular practice via SET (Simulated Emergency Test) experiences. Bravo to those of you have put in the time and effort to provide public security services with portable com center operations for both local and wide-area needs.

We'd love to see your comprehensive GO-BOX, but if not, how about a couple 8x10 photos (they are not expensive at Walgreen)

Casual, hobby activities in the field.

2) Others take on the challenge of operating in the field, perhaps at a local park, using a battery and small, portable radio and antenna. We could list a plethora of activities intended to tap into this group of Hams who have taken on the QRP (five watts or less) challenge.

Publications often highlight BICYCLE MOBILE or PEDESTRIAN MOBILE and so forth. Among these POTA has become very popular and well organized. There are variants like:

POTA (Parks On The Air)

SOTA (Summits On The Air)

IOTA (Islands On The Air)

VOTA (ARRL— Volunteers On The Air)

JOTA (Scouts—Jamboree On The Air)

And there are more. From experience with POTA several of us can attest to the fun challenge that each of these activities provides. The equipment used for these is far less comprehensive than that described in #1 above.

At the July RARA meeting I suggest that we showcase both areas. If you could possibly bring in your Go-Box, fine. You could just bring in your KX-2 or HW-8 for Show-And-Tell items, this would be fine. We'd be surprised that such a meeting might challenge our members to get active in one or both areas. You can help that by bringing in some gear... doesn't have to operate... no batteries required ... can be brought in a tote box, or your shirt pocket Tuna Tin 2 Why not? You can make this a really fun and interesting meeting. See you there, Dave Gauger W9CJS

I don't have a lot of field day history, but having a CW station allowed us to run 2A instead of 1A and that CW/ Digital station ran non-stop Saturday. The food was outstanding; thank you Dan (KD9SAZ), Jamie (W9JTC) and Jeremy for an awesome lunch and Verna (KD9YUM) for dinner. Sunday breakfast of the "custom doughnuts" compliments of Dan (KD9SAZ). As for publicity, Kevin (N9EGF) pulled a rabbit out of his hat with pre-event media coverage as well as reporting at the event on Saturday. Verna (KD9YUM) did a lot; she made flyers and posted them around town, kept the social media promotion going and helped with details I perhaps may have missed. Mike (KD9MED) brought out a PRC 320 British military HF rig (Falkland war era) for demonstration; that was fascinating; thank you Mike for coming out and bringing the rig. DX is a telegraphic shorthand for "distance" or "distant".

What is a DX-pedition?

A DX-pedition is an expedition to what is considered an exotic place by amateur radio operators and DX listeners, typically because of its remoteness, access restrictions, or simply because there are very few radio amateurs active from that place. This could be an island, a country, or even a particular spot on a geographical grid. Some locations are rare due to their extreme inaccessibility, such as Clipperton Island, Navassa Island or Desecheo Island.
